And now for something completely different... We picked up this idea from the Great Hobbies web site. This is an introductory IMAC competition event for any

Humber Valley Pilot or friend. All participants must

- **Have valid MAAC Insurance**
- Be a cleared pilot, and
- Fly within our noise rules

A full IMAC competition requires the pilot to fly a sequence of 10 maneuvers (shown right) without missing a beat. This introductory challenge is for pilots of all skills. All you have to do is fly 4 maneuvers in sequence (shown next page). Should be easy, right? The rules of this event are posted below.

Prizes? You get a great flying opportunity, great fun, great friends, great field, and great food and you want prizes too? This time the top 3 finishers get double the contest entry fee in cash (2 X \$0.00 = \$0.00) and bragging rights for a whole year. Can't beat that!



Humber Valley IMAC Challenge Rules What's the challenge?

- Each pilot flies these four maneuvers in a row (see next
- If you get confused and have to reposition yourself in between two maneuvers, you lose 1 point.
- Each maneuver is rated by the judges: 4 points = excellent, 3 points = good, 2 points = a bit messed up, 1 point = very messed up!
- You get two tries, each scored separately. The pilot with the most points in a single try wins!

Note: 4 maneuver challenge sequence is shown on the following page. Maneuvers are:

- Roll
- Half Cuban
- Stall Turn
- Loop

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

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IMAC BASIC Sequence – Just for Fun!

If you had fun with the IMAC challenge sequence why don't you try the official IMAC Basic Class sequence? It's a similar level of difficulty; the only difference is that there are 10 maneuvers instead of 4. These maneuvers are not that hard for any intermediate flyer if you do them one at a time. But when you put them together in a prescribed sequence, things get a lot more interesting (and difficult). Welcome to the world of IMAC. Take this diagram to the field and practice! 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Here are the 4 maneuvers for the IMAC Challenge:

1) Roll	
	 An ideal roll looks like The altitude doesn't change You finish with your wings horizontal
2) Half Cuban	
M'c Y	 An ideal half Cuban looks like A smooth, constant part loop The half` is well centered
3) Stall Turn

B	An ideal loop looks like
