January 8th Meeting Program – Bernie Lehman on the Avro Arrow

We are pleased to announce that Bernie Lehman will give a presentation on the multi-year design and refinement process



of building a RC model Avro Arrow. The Avro Arrow was one of the world's finest aircraft. It was scrapped on 'Black Friday', in 1959, by the Canadian government. All six aircraft were cut up and destroyed. Part of the

nose and the nose wheel assembly of one aircraft can be found in the Aviation Museum in Ottawa, Ontario. There have always been rumours that one of the Arrows survived the destruction.

Bernie's model Arrow is 80" long, 58" wide. His first model Arrow flew at the 1999 & 2000 Trenton (full size) air show. There will be video clips of the plane flying. After this plane unfortunately crashed he applied everything he learnt from it and is building a second version which he will bring to the meeting. He will also describe how the features of his new computer radio made a huge difference in his ability to fly the model. As an added feature he will pass on some very recently learnt inside information about the "real facts" surrounding the cancellation of the Avro Arrow project by the government.

You won't want to miss this rare opportunity to see and hear about this historic aircraft and it's tragic fate.

Remember Ed Miedzybrocki and Kevin McLeod who spoke to us at the October meeting on jets and turbines? Well they have



Survey Results

The survey results are published on the following page and are most interesting. We can thank Gary Del Bel Belluz for counting up all the responses. Here are some selected observations.

Members seem to be in favor of holding a summer and winter fun fly and the continuation of the beauty contest by strong majorities. However, the idea of a swap meet had mixed response.

Raffles seem to be a good idea to more than 75% of members. The ranking of preferred prizes is interesting to study. The 60-size ARF came in 3rd with 19 votes just ahead of a 60-size kit with 12 votes. It seems that a lot of people like 60 size, but more people would rather fly them than build them.

The social aspects of the club are very important to members (Questions 9 and 16).

According to Question 13 there were at least 43 crashes among the 55 respondents. Gentlemen, this is a dangerous hobby that we enjoy!

There is certainly room for improvement in our safety performance and the instruction program but only 10% to 15% thought these programs were poor or very poor.



Dave Whitton Speaks out on Safety

THWACK!!!

The unthinkable has just happened, and your finger hurts so much you feel it in your eyes.

I don't know if we have enough time in the universe to discuss this issue in it's entirety, but lets try and cover one or two of the more immediate things that need to be thought of.



A 40 - 60 size engine at idle, the prop is hard resin and after sanding (you do dull your props don't you?!!) is about as sharp as a butter knife, you stick your finger in because a pretty girl in a bikini walked past and you momentarily let your concentration slip, (we did mention that you never look away form your plane didn't we?), and now you have just whacked

your finger so hard you...

Except for the bit about the bikini, this scenario isn't as far out there as you might think. Make no mistake about it, you are in trouble. The cut to your finger from a prop is bad enough, but it's the shock you receive from a bone strike that can be the most dangerous.

Let's take a quick look at your options.

First, basic First Aid. You do of course have a decent gauze bandage in your flight box - right? Not some useless little thing with Fred Flintstone printed on it and a ouchless no stick pad that you borrowed from your kid. The seal is still intact isn't it? You also have a couple of those alcohol sterilizing patches as well - just to clean the oil off your fingers before you start poking around in an open wound. Of course you do, you're a Humber Flyer.

The first things you do are, sit down, get a bandage on the injury, apply pressure to stop the bleeding, and elevate the wound. Feeling a little faint, starting to sweat? That's shock starting to set in and it can kill you when you try to drive yourself to hospital. The actual shock may not kill you but the bridge abutment you drive into when you pass out behind the wheel enroute probably will. Shock is frequently overlooked as a serious component of an injury of this type. Shock is nothing to be fooled with.

If you don't have a bandage on hand, there should be one in the box mounted on the frequency board. The combination numbers are written underneath. Familiarize yourself with them next time you are at the field so that you know where they are in advance. Remember, in times of emergency (and acute pain), you are not likely to be at your mental best. Here is something else to think about. Do you know where the nearest Hospital is?

Get someone to drive you to the hospital, call a cab or ambulance if necessary, and have them meet you at the gas station. DO NOT DRIVE YOURSELF!

Here are some other points to think about. Do you fly alone? Many of us do when we have the opportunity to explore an empty sky at our leisure. Maybe we shouldn't. If we do, we had better make a point of being extra careful during start and run-up.

One final point. When was the last time you gave a decent amount of thought to your start up procedure? Let's have a club review and refresher during the March or April meeting.

Editor's NOTE:

As Dave said, don't forget that the **First Aid Box** at the field has a supply of gauze bandages, and antiseptic ointment. But it will not do you any good if you don't know how to open it. Please remember that **the combination is written on the underside of the box.** For your further protection, we advise you to write the combination on the front of your member card and try opening the lock the next time you are at the field. If you don't know how the lock works, ask someone to show you.

The combination to the lock is:
