
## Student Instruction Starts May 14th

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# Motion About Sunday Student Flying will be voted on May 7th

After some discussion, a motion was put forward by Richard Barlow and seconded by Pat Knight that the club rules be changed with respect to student flying on Sunday morning. This time has been traditionally reserved for cleared pilots. The problem is that if the field is not busy, and instructors fly students at this time, to do so would result in the flight violating our club safety rules and therefore violate our MAAC insurance. According to MAAC, you are not insured if you violate any club published rule. Therefore, providing there is no objection from other cleared pilots at the field, student flying sometimes does occur on Sunday morning.

The motion proposes that:

"The safety rules be amended to say that on Sunday mornings until 2:00pm, cleared pilots have priority use of the field and student flying is <u>discouraged</u>, instead of being <u>prohibited</u> until 3:00pm."

We will vote on this motion at the May meeting. If you feel strongly about this issue, make sure you voice your opinion and vote at the May meeting. If you cannot attend and wish to vote for or against the motion – you may e-mail or mail your proxy vote to one of the club executive.

# Motion to build Sun Shelter will be voted on May 7th.

David Plank has researched and designed a shelter and has estimated the costs involved. Garry Del Bel Belluz has been in contact with the city and has received verbal approval that we will be allowed to build a sun shelter at the field. The plan is to have the shelter to the east of the frequency board facing the flight line between the two small trees replacing the hedge. The following picture was made using computer editing so you can get an idea of what it would look like.



There has been considerable discussion about the idea of a shelter and there are strong views on both sides. I can tell you that the executive is split on the issue but we will put it to a vote at the meeting and we will abide by the results of the vote. We will vote on this motion at the May 7<sup>th</sup> meeting.

If you feel strongly about this issue, make sure you voice your opinion and vote at the May meeting. If you cannot attend and wish to vote for or against the motion – you may e-mail or mail your proxy vote to one of the club executive.



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# Safety Talk – by Dave Whitton

A number of years ago I attended a training seminar and was presented with the following mechanism supposedly useful



as a way of quantifying people. It actually is useful in explaining the process of skill development through to the point of mastery. Wrapped in the guise of RC flying we can find a reasonably good way of illustrating pilot competence in relation to a skill set. In a gentle way it can give us a

sense of where we think we fit in and give us some awareness of others levels of abilities and skills when we share the air with them. As they say, "knowledge is a good thing". Competence in this case equals skill and mastery.

Consider that there are four basic categories that you as a pilot can be placed in. Have a read and see where you fit?

1) Consciously Incompetent

- the new student (self explanatory)
- actually it means you don't have any skill whatsoever and you know it.

#### 2) Unconsciously Incompetent

- because you have passed the test you think you have more skill than you really do. Your true lack of experience is unknown to you. You can take off, land and burn holes in the sky - you mean there is more?
- the recently graduated pilot.
- mechanical flying
- few self imposed limits
- undisciplined flying
- not enough experience to stay out of trouble
- handles simple emergencies but survives more by luck than skill (if survives at all)
- very limited technical repertoire
- rudimentary spatial awareness

#### 3) Consciously Competent


- flying demonstrates consistency
- has developed personal limits and displays selfdiscipline
- makes fewer technical mistakes in the air
- can handle most emergency situations
- flying is somewhat mechanical but transitioning
- is developing and mastering a technical repertoire
- Is starting to make the transition from that of consciously flying the airplane with the hands to that of flying by feel
- has a moderate sense of spatial awareness and control of same

#### 4) Unconsciously Competent

- makes few technical errors.
- handles emergencies
- flies mostly by thinking the airplane and not the hands through the moves
- has an advanced sense of spatial awareness
- a developed repertoire
- structures flying either consciously or unconsciously

Most of us will fit into one of these categories with the exception of a very few who have been able to push beyond and develop a truly high level of technical and imaginative expertise and mastery. Those people we call "Masters" and for good reason (just think Tiger Woods).

So, what does all this have to do with Safety? In short, the most dangerous person on the field is... the newly minted pilot. Like any adolescent, they can get it up, they can play with it, if they're lucky they won't break it and they can get it back down in one piece ready for the next round. At the same time, they really don't know what to do with it and are desperate to find out. We're talking airplanes here folks! Only time, experience and hopefully a little guidance from that much older babysitter from down the street can ease this terrible burden and frustration.



As you know, our club members are very generous when it comes to helping out. If you ever find yourself on the flight line and in trouble just give a yell and see how many people come running. If you are one of our less experienced pilots and are having trouble getting that landing lined up properly, don't be surprised if someone shows up at your elbow to help guide you safely back to earth.

Don't be a Dumbo! Fly Safely!

As this is the last article of the season, I'll leave you with the following thought.

*Care, Courtesy, and Common Sense* on the field and in the air are the best safety and flying skills you can bring to the field. Sadly, it is proven true that common sense isn't innate, it is taught.


## Treasurer's Message – Mark Painter

### HVRC Combat Club Tournament Sunday May 12<sup>th</sup> 1:00pm

That special breed of new combat flyers has started practicing this exciting mode of flying. John Homes and David Plank spent some time last week chasing each other around the sky as a preamble to real combat flying. David reports that it was great fun, and he found it fairly easier than he expected to keep the opponent's plan in sight.

An inaugural mini combat tournament event will be held on Sunday May 12<sup>th</sup> starting at 1:00pm, as an alternate if the weather is bad. John is reviewing the American combat rules,



and coming up with a simplified version for us to use as an introductory set of rules. Once we get

the hang of it, then we can decide if we want to add in all the stringent engine start and timing rules the Americans use.

Each pilot requires a "spotter"... someone that stands beside them, and can direct them to the enemy and help avoid midair collisions, as well as warning the pilot of any out of bounds flying. Each pilot will be responsible for arranging his own spotter.

John will have more information on the basic combat rules at the May meeting, but in the meantime, pilots with SPAD combat planes should try to finish them as soon as possible. Either way, all pilots, students, guests and future hopeful combat participants are encouraged to come to the field on Sunday to witness the carnage!

NOTE TO REGULAR PILOTS: Combat flights last only 10-15 minutes so there will still be airtime for regular flying. Your co-operation is appreciated.

# Possible Free Money for Humber Valley!

It may be possible for the club to receive money from the Trillium foundation for a capital development grant



to offset the costs of the shelter or even possible some of the field improvements and repairs. They allow a maximum of \$75,000 per year for 5 years!!! Obviously we don't need anything like that, so we are hopeful they will be willing to help us with our comparatively meager needs.

David Plank has the application information and is working with Mark Painter, Treasurer to detail some of our annual costs and any equity we have, as well as the budget for any projects we are looking to have funded. David is exploring the possibilities and will report to the club on the results. This could be a great benefit to Humber Valley!

### Vice President's Message – Gary Plank

On Monday, April 22<sup>nd</sup> I met with Jim Wakelin, Supervisor with Parks Department. at the field. Bob Cunningham from the maintenance department accompanied us on the site inspection. I had previously sent Jim a letter outlining the club's needs and wishes a few weeks earlier. He has agreed to assist us by providing the following;

- 10 yards of triple mix for field repair to be delivered before May 11
- 10 yards of crushed gravel for the pit area to be delivered before May 11
- Garbage pick-up after field clean-up day from parking area, bag small waste, pile large waste (after May 11)
- Parking lot re-surfacing with fresh limestone and graded (date to be set)
- Road potholes and muddy sections filled in and graded (date to be set)
- Damaged gate hinges and hardware have been replaced / repaired

Bob has walked the western perimeter of Thackery Park. He found one gap in the fence and closed it off. He plans to inspect the northeast opening in the fence soon. That should discourage of the motorized vehicles. Even though the snow and wind kept our meeting time to a minimum, it was a pleasure to meet with Jim and Bob to discuss field issues. Jim commented on how close he lives to the 400 club north of Toronto. We'll have to heighten his interest in model airplanes with a few flying lessons some day!

The club wishes to thank the Parks Department for their continued support and co-operation and allowing us the use of the field.
